Important: First Day Attendance Policy

The University of Wisconsin-Marquette has adopted a policy which allows a student to be administratively dropped from a course if:

- 1) he/she does not attend the first scheduled session and
- 2) fails to notify the instructor prior to the first class of his/her absence.

Admission to UW-Marquette

Students planning to attend summer courses ONLY at UW-Marquette must submit a special student application. Students planning on continuing their enrollment at UW-Marquette for fall should complete the regular undergraduate admission application and supply all appropriate documents. Admission applications may be obtained from the Student Services office or you may apply online at www.apply.wisconsin.edu.

Transferability of Courses

Courses taken at UW-Marquette or online will transfer to colleges and universities nationwide. For information regarding how courses transfer to UW baccalaureate campuses, visit www.uwsa.edu/tis/ and go to "Credit Transfer Wizards."

Financial Aid

Six credit hours of summer courses are considered half-time for financial aid purposes. To be considered for financial aid through UW-Marquette, a student must be admitted as a **regular** (not as a special) student. The student must also have completed and submitted a 2011 - 12 Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) form using 2010 taxes. Students are encouraged to apply online at www.fafsa.gov. If you attend another campus and are enrolling at UW-Marquette just for the summer, contact your campus Financial Aid Office to discuss the possibility of a Consortium Agreement for summer financial aid. Tuition and fees are payable by cash or check on campus or by credit card online in PRISM. Once registered, if you decide not to attend classes, you **must** officially withdraw prior to the first day of classes at the Student Services Office to limit your financial obligation.

For payments not received by the due date listed in the calendar section, your registration will be canceled and **you will be automatically charged a \$50 withdrawal fee per session.** If you choose to be reinstated, the \$50 fee + full tuition must be paid. No grace period and no exceptions. To avoid the \$50 withdrawal fee, you must drop a summer course prior to the course tuition deadline.

Returned Checks

A \$25 charge (plus any applicable bank charges) will be assessed for checks returned by the bank for "non-sufficient funds."

2-WEEK SESSION: MAY 29 - JUNE 8

CPS 106 Microsoft Word

1 credit #1002 12:00-1:15 pm MTWThF M-108 Craver
In this f2f* course learn text entry, editing, manipulation, and presentation. Covers typical as well as many advanced procedures of word processing and presentation software. This course involves extensive hands-on experience. Students may not receive credit for both CPS 106 and CPS 105. AP

3-WEEK SESSION: MAY 29 - JUNE 15

CTA 103 Introduction to Public Speaking

3 credits #1003 5:00-8:30 pm MTWTh M-117 Maurer
This f2f course is a study of the principles and techniques of effective speaking and listening in a variety of selected communication experiences. AP

GEO 130 Human Impact on the Environment

4 credits #1004 8:00 am-1:00 pm TTh F-108 West
A blended (f2f/online) natural science course describing the alteration of the physical environment with the resulting effects on air, water, soils, vegetation, animal life and humans. Field trip(s) may be required. GEO130 meets DPI requirements for environmental education at some UW baccalaureate institutions. NS; if 4 cr, also LS with lab work. There is a special course fee of \$35.00. NS/LS

6-WEEK SESSION: MAY 29 - JULY 6 (No Class 7/4)

MAT 110 College Algebra

3 credits #1005 1:30-4:45 pm MW M-107 Bartlett
This flipped (lectures online/homework in class) course examines the definition of function; linear and non-linear functions and graphs including logarithmic and exponential functions; systems of linear equations; theory of polynomial equations, and optional topics such as mathematical induction, matrix solution of linear systems, and Cramer's rule. Prereq: A grade of C or better in MAT 105 or placement based on placement test score. CR/MS

MAT 117 Elementary Statistics

3 credits #1006 8:30-11:45 am MW M-107 Almanassa
The primary aim of this f2f course is a basic understanding and use of statistical concepts and methods to facilitate study and research in other disciplines. Includes measures of central tendency, measures of variability, grouped data, the normal distribution, central limit theorem, hypothesis testing, estimation, T-distribution and chi square test. Prereq: a grade of C or better in MAT 105 or MAT 108 or equivalent. MS

8-WEEK SESSION: JUNE 11 - AUG. 3 (No class 7/4)

CHE 125 Introduction to Chemistry

5 credits #1008 Lec 8:00-11:30 am MW M-117 Klemp
Lab 12:00-3:30 pm MW M-222 Klemp
A one-semester introductory course in college chemistry including an introduction to organic chemistry. Consists of lectures, discussions, and laboratories. Primarily for students whose programs require only CHE 125 or CHE 125-203 combination. Students may not count both CHE 125 and CHE 145 toward the natural science or laboratory science requirement for the Associate degree. Recommended: demonstrated competency at MAT 105 level or concurrent MAT 105 registration. NS/LS

4-WEEK SESSION: JUNE 18 - JULY 13 (No class 7/4)

BUS 194 Career and Life Planning

2 credits #1007 12:00-1:20 pm M-F M-107 Craver
This f2f course will enable students to develop career goals and lay out a path for achieving these goals. Students will examine their personal interests, aptitudes, values, decision-making skills, academic plans, and career awareness. This personal, educational, and occupational information will then be organized and translated into an individualized course of action. Integration of career goals with current and future college course work will be stressed. AP

6-WEEK SESSION: JUNE 18 - JULY 27 (No class 7/4)

ENG 102 Composition II

3 credits #1010 1:30-4:45 pm TTh M-107 Learst
This f2f class is a rhetoric course that focuses on writing which presents information, ideas, and arguments, with attention to the essay and techniques of documentation. Emphasis will be on academic writing which is applicable across the curriculum. Prereq: A grade of C or better in ENG 101 or exemption based on placement test score, or cons. instr. CR

MAT 091 Elementary Algebra

3 ND credits #1011 5:00-7:30 pm MTTh M-109 Meisner
This f2f course is intended for students with little or no previous algebra. Topics include the real number system and operations with real numbers and algebraic expressions, linear equations and inequalities, polynomials, factoring, and introduction to quadratic equations. Course does not carry degree credit.

MAT 105 Introduction to College Algebra

3 credits #1012 5:00-7:30 pm MTTh M-107 Spink
This f2f course Emphasizes algebraic techniques with polynomials, fractional expressions, exponents and radicals, linear and quadratic equations, and inequalities. Introduction to functions, their graphs, and analytic geometry. Prereq: A grade of C or better in Elementary Algebra or placement based on placement test score. EL

3-WEEK SESSION: JULY 16 - AUGUST 3

HES 217 Social Aspects of Sport

3 credits #1013 5:00-8:15 pm TTh F-108 Kowalski
This blended (f2f/online) course focuses on sport institutions as social organizations and how they function within a culture or society. Emphasis is placed on group structure and membership, as well as group pressure, socialization, stratification, and deviance as they apply to the sport's setting. Significant emphasis is placed on the role of minorities in sports. Selected topics include sport and: educational institutions, socialization, children, deviance, violence and aggression, gender and equity, race and ethnicity, social class, social mobility and stratification, economy, politics, religion, and the media. WOM 210 Women's Health & Sexuality in Society

3 credits #1014 1:00-4:30 pm MTWTh M-109 Hendrick
This f2f course will offer basic facts about the structure and functioning of the female body; issues in women's health and sexuality will be approached interdisciplinarily and will include physical, mental, emotional, and social health and wellness topics and will be framed by discussions of race, class, and other cultural identities. Cultural, social, economic and political contexts will be explored. SS/ES

Online Registration

Begins: March 1, 2012 Ends: May 24, 2012
Semester runs: June 11 - August 3, 2012

You will register for UWC Online courses through UW Colleges PRISM self-service system just as you would for any on-campus courses. Note: UWC Online has different registration dates and requirements than UWC campuses. Check www.online.uwc.edu for accurate information.

Tuition & Fees for Online Courses

UWC Online course tuition, fees, payment requirements, and payment schedules differ from requirements at all other UWC campuses. Online course fees are \$225 per credit plus a \$20 per credit administrative fee (refundable only through May 24). Your seat in the course is not secure until your Online tuition and fees are paid in full or, if you are a UWC degree seeking student receiving financial aid, UWC Online must be able to confirm that your aid has been fully processed, awarded, and

accepted (including all loan processing) to know that you have sufficient guaranteed financial aid to cover the full amount of your UWC Online tuition and fees.

Check www.online.uwc.edu for tuition postings and accurate payment information. You will NOT receive an invoice; please follow payment instructions carefully.

Once the semester begins, UWC Online tuition is refundable according to the institution-wide UWC tuition refund policy and calendar.

Dropping Online Courses

UWC Online does not have an add period. Once Online registration closes, students may drop but not add. Once the semester begins, UWC Online follows the institution-wide UWC drop policy and calendar.
